This past weekend, Eastern Mennonite High School performed *Our Town*. With showings on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, the cast put on an excellent play for the local community. The play was directed by English and drama teacher Mark Gornto. Eleanor Albers and Emily Hess played the roles of Emily and George. Eleanor said, "While other shows performed at EMHS have had large sets and a focus on realism, *Our Town* has a more minimalist set and doesn't try to force realism."

BLOOD AND FLESH: WHOSE IS BEST

Communion is the service of Christian worship at which bread and wine are consecrated and shared by those baptized to symbolize Christ's physical sacrifice. A Christian tradition that has been practiced for two-thousand years that is widely practiced is bound to have variations across various denominations and congregations. In this week's article, our experts-- Paige Hutcheson and Anna Miller-- explore this variation throughout the local Christian churches by inquiring about attendees' opinions. Each church will receive a rating on the body and the blood substitutes out of five.

At the bottom of our list, we have Emmanuel Episcopal Church. Their Eucharist consists of a paper-like wafer complemented with a dry wine. This combination creates a bitter atmosphere around the palette that is highly undesirable. An attendant of Emmanuel stated, "I hate the taste," and "[it] is only good if you're fasting." Both the wafer and the wine got a rating of $\frac{1}{5}$, a truly low score, so unless you forgot to eat your breakfast, you might want to refrain from indulging in this Communion.

Next on the list is Blessed Sacrament Roman Catholic Church, with an overall decent Communion experience.

A thin, tasteless wafer is paired with a melodious wine. The overall rating for the bread is a $\frac{1}{5}$.

Although the Catholic Church is the oldest denomination, its wafers certainly leave something to be desired. Members describe it as "not much like bread," "basically paper with an aftertaste," and "crunchy but in a stale way." The wine was contrastingly popular, gaining an overall $\frac{4}{5}$ wine points. Both red wine and white wine are served depending on the season in the church calendar.

Lindale Mennonite Church is rated smack in the middle. The bread got an average rating of $\frac{4}{5}$ while the juice served got a rating of $\frac{3}{5}$. The bread is homemade and gluten-free and is overall enjoyable. The juice got a slightly lower rating because, evidently, Lindalians are juice haters. Lindale will provide you with a somewhat average Eucharist experience, and you can decide if they're justified in their juice-hating.

Next, we have Park View Mennonite Church. This church works hard to cater to the dietary needs of the congregation. They have home-baked gluten and dairy-free bread that they complement with sweet, off-brand grape juice. Members of this church have rated the bread a $\frac{4}{5}$ and the juice a $\frac{3}{5}$. Overall the Communion indulged in at Park View is above average, and one could even say enjoyable.

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At the top of the list is The Church of the Incarnation. They offer an inclusive approach to communion, offering both wine and grape juice. Normal bread is offered in addition to gluten and dairy-free bread options. The bread is a homemade loaf complemented by a sweet port, a delectable combo. Members at this church give both the bread and the wine a 5/5. One attendee said, "I don't think any other churches in the area could beat it." Besides creating a sinful pride of communion within the members, Incarnation overall has the best eucharist experience.

This not-so-unbiased Eucharist review proclaims the Church of the Incarnation has the tastiest communion served while Emmanuel Episcopal Church members cringe at their dry wafer and wine. Hopefully, this article provided you, the reader, with previously unknown knowledge of the Communion experiences of local churches in the Harrisonburg area. 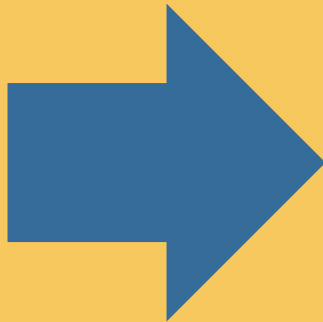
“How do I start hustling in high school?”

4 FOURS ROLL PAST LION IN WILD CARD GAME

In Premier Soccer League action in Harrisonburg the 4 Fours rolled past the Lions 5-2. The first goal was scored by Simon Blosser of the 4 Fours about a quarter through the first half, and they didn't stop there, Simon scoring two more goals and Layla von Arnswaldt also scoring right before halftime, where the 4 Fours had a dominating lead of 4-0.

We then asked Daniel Castaneda, Jace Gredler, Cole Herr, Everett Brubaker, and Samuel Aponte, all soccer players in the league, who would win. All of them thought the 4 Fours would win. We also asked them if the Lions would score a goal or not, and only one person said they would.

The second half then commenced with Izzy Oscan now in goal for the 4 Fours. He ended up making several good plays, but Emilee Shenk of the Lions scored twice. Izzy was then put out in the field where he scored a goal on Lions goalie Colton Hottinger. Hottinger was then replaced as goalie by Elyann Malvaez, the stand-in coach of the team with Tyler Blosser, the Lions coach, sick. Elyann ended up making several insane plays in goal, saving some insane shots, including two by Ben Yoder and 1 by Simon but it was not enough. The game ended that way, 5-2.

We interviewed Izzy, who had scored a goal and saved several shots as goalie. "I don't know why I was put in there as goalie," Izzy said. "I didn't play the position at all during the regular season. I think I had a pretty decent game today, because I hadn't played goalie at all before today." We also interviewed Ben Yoder, who plays defense and midfield for the 4 Fours about their next matchup against the number one ranked Flaming Sparks. "I think it's going to be a challenge, and we're going to have to work really hard to make it to the finals," he said.

And finally, we interviewed Elyann Malvaez, the stand in captain about how it felt to lose to end their season. "Obviously, it's very disappointing for our entire team that we lost this game," he said. "I expected more from this team and I think all of us, including me, could have tried harder."

The goal leader for the 4 Fours was Simon Blosser, with three goals, while the leader for the Lions was Emilee Shenk, with both of the goals for the Lions under her name. The 4 Fours finished with 17 shots on goal and their goalies combined for 8 saves. The Lions finished with 10 shots on goal and 12 saves. The 4 Fours will play the Flaming Sparks tomorrow at 2:07.

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
